Colorado lawmakers are moving quickly on two election bills that could reshape who can run for office and how candidates qualify for the ballot.

projects that invest at least \$250 million, while another would impose strict environmental rules, including a requirement for 100 percent renewable energy by 2031.

The decision will shape whether Colorado becomes a major technology hub or places tighter limits on the industry's growth.

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One proposal would ban individuals from holding multiple elected offices at the same time. Another would change rules for how candidates gain access to the ballot. Supporters say the bills promote transparency and fairness.

Critics argue they could limit voter choice and reshape political competition in the state. The legislation is advancing rapidly through the General Assembly and could soon reach the governor's desk.

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Some legislators used "points of personal privilege," a procedural rule meant for issues affecting the dignity or operation of the chamber, to deliver policy arguments and political criticism.

Republican leaders warned the practice risks undermining the institution and urged members to follow the rules designed to keep legislative debate focused and orderly.
